Annotated Basis for Decision in re Application for Revocation of Two-Year Alien Residence Requirement of Section 212(d), Immigration and Nationality Act of 1950, Title I.

Mrs. Soetoro, the U.S. citizen spouse of the applicant was contacted telephonically on May 12, 1967.

She advised that her husband is still employed by the Indonesian Government and is not being negatively affected and has been offered employment with the same company. She further advised that she is able to contact only two members of his family.

Mrs. Soetoro now advises that her Postgraduate Degree in Anthropology will be completed in August 1967 instead of June 1967 as previously expected. This is due to a last minute finding that she is short of five credits.

Mrs. Soetoro further advised that she has written to the American Embassy and various firms in Indonesia in an attempt to find suitable employment in that country. No answer to her letters had been received at this time.

She also told us that she has submitted applications for visas to cover her intended return to the United States in the fall of 1967. She further advised that she has no plans to leave the United States before the end of 1967.

This refers to your application for a waiver of the foreign residence requirement of section 212(d)(1) of the Immigration and Nationality Act, filed on the 11th day of March, 1968.

After consideration of your application, it is my opinion that you have failed to establish by clear and convincing evidence that you were lawfully admitted to the United States as an alien prior to January 1, 1965, and that you have not been lawfully admitted to the United States since January 1, 1965, and that you are not lawfully admitted to the United States under section 201(b) of the Immigration and Nationality Act.

Your wife is now confined at the Infirmary of St. Louis, a facility of Honolulu General Hospital. As far as we know, she is confined there as a patient, this represents her sole income. Your wife has expenses of approximately \$100.00 per month for the care of her son and from \$10.00 to \$15.00 per month for the care of her husband. She will also incur expenses for food, clothing, medical care, and other necessities. We believe that she can meet these expenses without undue hardship.







I am submitting this statement of explanation in the knowledge that, should I fail to get the two-year foreign residence requirement waved, it would impose great hardship on my wife and have a disastrous effect on both our lives.

My wife, Ann Stanton, is a citizen of the United States and has resided here all her life. It is presently impossible for my wife to return to Indonesia with me. The reasons are multiple. Financially, both of us having been students, there is no way of not accumulating the required money (more than \$600 for my wife alone). Ninth Element states that the salary of even a college graduate provides anti-American feeling her received a favoritish pitch unless she be forced to cut short her college education, but she would not be able to do this without causing her to drop out at the present time. Of secondary importance is the fact that my wife is a Christian and would be compelled to leave her religion if she be forced to cut short her college education, but she would not be able to do this without causing her to drop out at the present time. Filing a waiver, then, my only alternative would be to return to the U.S. and live there until my wife can join me, but this too is filled with difficulties. My wife has only one year experience in U.S. and although she would be incomplete, she is ill-prepared to be self-supporting. Yet,

at a distance of Indonesia, I would be helpless to contribute to her support. With my strong ties in the United States, I would meet with much prejudice myself in seeking employment. And, with the present devaluation of the Indonesian currency, salaries from a college graduate amounts to less than 10% of what I earned there.

With your regard to which to communicate with the Indonesian Government, I am sending you a copy of the letter I wrote to the Minister of Education and Culture, Dr. Suryadi, in which I asked him to consider my application for a teaching position at the University of Indonesia.

neasan government is no longer able to guarantee the safety of corps members. It seems probable that warfare in Indonesia cannot be avoided much longer. I am a trained geographer with a special background in mapping and air photo interpretation. I have traveled throughout the Indonesian islands and have detailed knowledge of each of the major areas and their resources. Due to my former competitive association with the Indonesian army while still a student, it is quite probable that I would be placed at the front lines without proper orders from the Indonesian government.

On the basis of my present knowledge of the Indonesian situation, I would advise you to take the following steps:
1. Request immediate withdrawal of all American personnel from Indonesia.
2. Request immediate withdrawal of all American military equipment from Indonesia.
3. Request immediate withdrawal of all American military supplies from Indonesia.
4. Request immediate withdrawal of all American military aircraft from Indonesia.
5. Request immediate withdrawal of all American military ships from Indonesia.
6. Request immediate withdrawal of all American military personnel from Indonesia.

The above steps will be taken immediately if I receive word of a major conflict between Indonesia and the United States.






