Administrative Basis for Decision in re: Application for Waiver of Two-Year Foreign Residence Requirement of Section 212(a)(9), Immigration and Nationality Act of 1952, etc.

Mrs. Soetoro, the U.S. citizen spouse of the applicant was contacted telephonically on May 12, 1967.

She advised that her husband is still employed by the Indonesian Government, and as before she described his salary as being meagerly, and that he is able to exist only by having other members of his family.

Mrs. Soetoro now advises that her Bachelor's Degree in Anthropology will be completed in August 1967 instead of June 1, 1967 as previously expected, which is due to a last minute change that she is short a requirement.

Mrs. Soetoro related that she has written to the American Embassy and various firms in Indonesia in an attempt to find suitable employment in that country. No answer to her letters had been received at this time.

She also told me that she has submitted applications for visas to enter Indonesia to her husband and child in a previous marriage. She advised that she and her husband had been married in Indonesia to a certain extent, and she is the daughter of a certain official in the U.S. as approved by the Board of Education in Indonesia.

On arrival to the U.S. Immigration & Naturalization Service for a review of the two year residence requirement of the Immigration and Nationality Act, the level of this requirement was the highest that was possible. I was advised that I was offered that it was a discretionary hardship for me to be with my father that I should be granted.

I am now listed with my name in the files which they send from Honolulu to the University. My son by a former marriage lives there with us.

As hardship is defined under the present laws, I don't feel that I would undergo any exceptional hardship if my husband were to depart from the United to reside abroad as the regulations require.

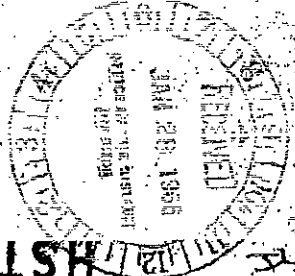

My wife, Ann Santiago, is a citizen of the United States and has resided here all her life. It is presently impossible for my wife to return to Indonesia with me. The reasons are multiple. Financially, both of us having been students, there is no way I can accumulate the necessary money (more than \$600 for my wife alone). Within Indonesia at the present time that the salary of even a college graduate provides anti-American feeling has reached a feverish pitch under been advised by both family and friends in Indonesia that at the present time. Of secondary importance is the fact she be forced to cut short her college education, but she Failing a waiver, then, my only alternative would be But this too is filled with difficulties. at a distance of Indonesia, I would be helpless to contribute to her support. With my strong ties in the United States, I would meet with much prejudice myself in seeking employment. And, with the present devaluation of the Indonesian rupiah, the monthly salary for a college graduate amounts to less than two dollars when translated into

US dollars. I have been forced to turn to my family for financial support. My family is unable to provide for my needs. I have no other means of support. I am in a desperate situation. I have no other choice but to seek your help. I am sure that you will understand my situation and will provide me with the assistance I need. I am grateful for your help and support. I will be forever indebted to you for your kindness and generosity. I hope that you will be able to help me in my time of need. I am sure that you will be able to do so. I am also a member of the United States Geographical Society and have a deep understanding of the geographical features of the region. I would be able to provide valuable information on the terrain and resources of the area.

In the event of my being accepted for military service, I would be willing to serve wherever needed. I am a member of the United States Army Reserve and am prepared to serve in any capacity that may be required.

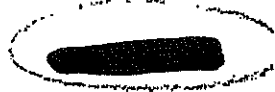

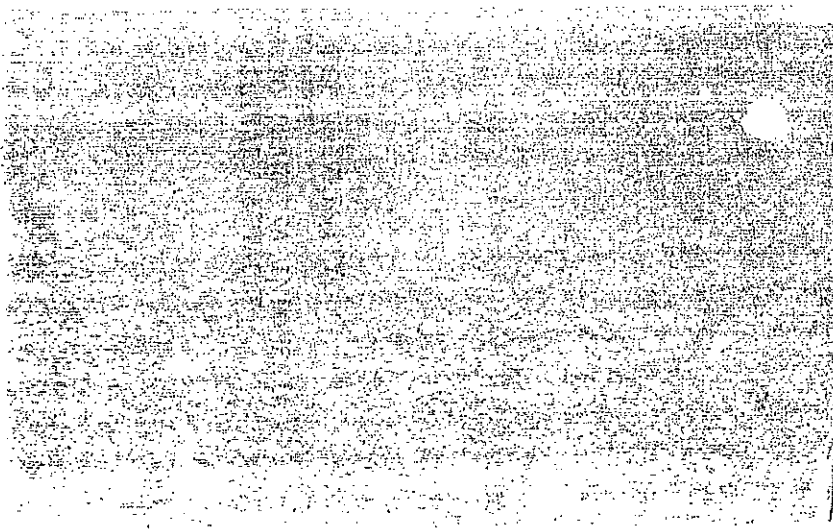

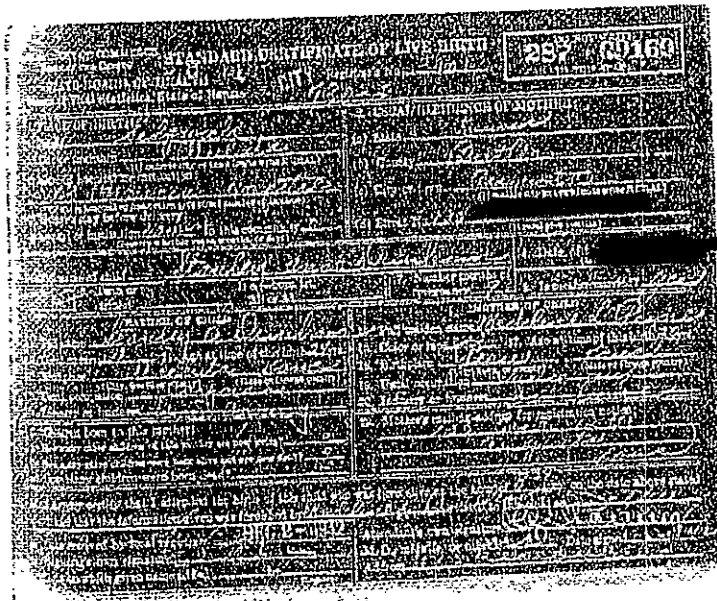
